

Speeches and Evaluations



THE 20 CENT QUESTION Speaker: Lars Evaluator: Yannís

Admitting that we all encounter problems, Lars told us about the difficulties he had experienced with his washing machine. It began making "a terrible, terrible noise" and left the laundry soaking wet. With a three-year-old in the home, he felt sure that the child was responsible. However, he warned us against being narrow-minded when we approach problems, as further investigation revealed a twenty-cent piece lodged in the workings!

Yannis noted Lars' confidence and ease, moving around the lectern and using gestures to show counting and to describe the machine's movements. It was a great and relatable story, and Lars' smiles and laughter conveyed enthusiasm. Lars used pauses well but Yannis suggested he could vary these to play more with suspense. A second piece of advice was to keep notes in his hand rather than having to return to the lectern. A final challenge was for Lars to record himself – which seems like good advice for all of us!



MY LIETIME MENTOR Speaker: Amelíe Evaluator: María

Amelie noted she is more often mentor than mentee. However, she told us about two women who had acted as mentors for her, and then she focused on the one person who has been her 'lifetime' influence. She outlined how he was supportive, respectful, and always committed. Although he died ten years ago, she still refers to him – her father - and follows his advice.

Amelie had made this 'Toastmasters subject' lively, Maria said. By discussing her experiences, she had been able to describe the role and task of the mentor, "talking about the subject without talking about it!" Maria noted that Amelie had been at ease with this subject, which she had made "original and personal." She praised Amelie's eye contact and the clarity and construction of the speech but wondered if Amelie might have considered the roles of mentor (her father) and coach (the women) differed, and she thought it might have been useful if we had been given some specific tips about how to be a good Toastmasters mentor.



"Don't you hate it when..." Anaelle opened, telling us about things people said she'd enjoy, but which she was convinced she'd hate, only to discover much later that the person had been right after all! - Specifically, in this case, gym classes. Over the years, she attempted various sports but only when Anaelle was close to burnout did she discover her real need of exercise. She is now exercising five times weekly: this she calls "my new normal," confessing "I didn't expect it!"

Ava commended Anaelle's willingness to take on the role of speaker when she was also Toastmaster of the Evening – "Kudos!" She enjoyed Anaelle's narrative of a personal story (taking us from her childhood through a difficult period, to today) which helped us to relate to the message, "so honest, so real." Ava enjoyed the humor of the speech, suggesting that Anaelle could have "leaned in harder" to the sarcasm. She noted Anaelle's ability to use tones and looks to convey her feelings, and thought using extra pauses here would allow the audience time to react to these. Finally, she recommended playing with the "dueling" in the story to exaggerate the difference between the "annoying but right" challenger and Anaelle's reacting voice.

Anne described herself as "the quiet one, very introverted growing up." Having found Toastmasters on social media, she feels it would fit well with her business goals or the year. Although she has facilitated many workshops, she found the Toastmasters meeting structure "totally different."

Chadia had heard this was "a wonderful place to practice public speaking in English." She laughed that she was "much more comfortable" watching procedures from a guest seat and was impressed by members' creativity and the humor.
